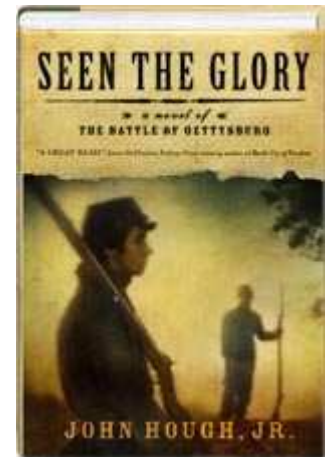
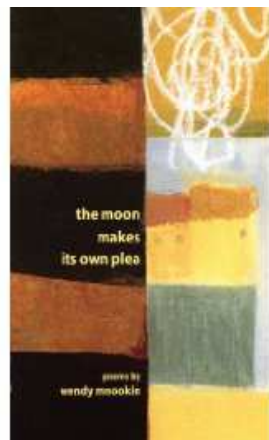
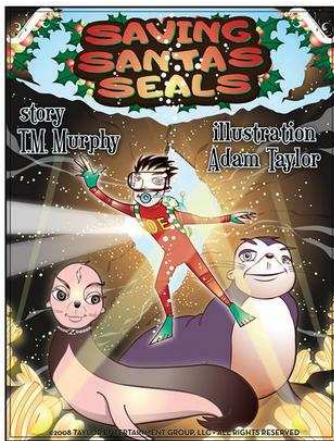
BREAKFAST WITH THE AUTHORS

WENDY MNOOKIN: *THE MOON MAKES ITS OWN PLEA*

Wendy Mnookin's fourth published collection of poems explores the idea of self, relationships, and the state of being mortal. She teaches poetry at Emerson College, and at Grub Street, a non-profit Boston writing center. Her poems have won prizes from various journals, including *The Comstock Review*, *The Kansas Quarterly* and *New Millennium Writings*.

ELLEN STEINBAUM: *CONTAINER GARDENING*

Ellen Steinbaum describes her newest book of poetry "as a collection of poems about what is perishable, what endures, and what makes us who we are." Aside from being a widely published poet, Ellen was a columnist for *The Boston Globe* from 2002 until March, 2009. She also wrote and performs her one-person play called *Centerpiece*.

JOHN HOUGH, JR.: *SEEN THE GLORY*

Seen the Glory is the tale of two young Martha's Vineyard brothers who enlist in the Union Army, and ultimately fight in the battle at Gettysburg. John Hough, Jr. depicts what the Civil War experience was like for these young men who were raised by their abolitionist father and Cape Verdean housekeeper. This book is both a moving coming-of-age tale, as well as a historical account of one of the most famous battles in our country's history.
